NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an Annual General and Special Meeting of the Shareholders (“**Meeting**”) of **GGL RESOURCES CORP.** (the “**Company**”) will be held on Monday, August 31, 2026, at the hour of 11:00 a.m. (Vancouver time, PDT), for the following purposes:

1. to receive and consider the Financial Statements of the Company for the financial year ended November 30, 2025, together with the report of the auditors thereon;
2. to appoint auditors of the Company for the ensuing year and to authorize the Directors to fix their remuneration;
3. to elect directors of the Company for the ensuing year;
4. to consider, and if thought fit, to pass an ordinary resolution ratifying, confirming, and approving the Company’s 10% rolling stock option plan, as more particularly described in the Information Circular;
5. to consider, and if thought advisable, to pass with or without variation, an ordinary resolution of disinterested shareholders to approve an option agreement between the Company and Strategic Metals Ltd., which constitutes a fundamental acquisition by the Company and a related party transaction, and thus requires disinterested shareholder approval as per the policies of the TSX Venture Exchange, as more particularly disclosed in the Information Circular prepared in connection with the Meeting; and
6. to transact such further or other business as may properly come before the Meeting or any adjournment or adjournments thereof.

All matters set forth above for consideration at the Meeting are more particularly described in the Information Circular.

Accompanying this Notice of Meeting are the Information Circular, the form of proxy or Voting Instruction Form, and the Financial Statement Request Form, as well as a return prepaid envelope for use by shareholders to send in their proxy. A proxy will not be valid unless it is deposited at the office of Computershare Investor Services Inc., 8th Floor, 100 University Avenue, Toronto, Ontario, M5J 2Y1 NOT LATER than 11:00 a.m., Vancouver time, on August 27, 2026.

SOLICITATION OF PROXIES

Solicitation of Proxies by Management

This Management Information Circular (“Circular”) is being furnished in connection with the solicitation of proxies by the management of GGL Resources Corp. (the “Company”) for use at the Annual General and Special Meeting of the shareholders of the Company to be held on Monday, the 31st day of August 2026 (the “Meeting”) at the time and place and for the purposes set forth in the Notice of Annual General and Special Meeting (“Notice”) and any adjournment or postponement thereof.

Cost and Manner of Solicitation

While it is expected that the solicitation will be primarily by mail, proxies may be solicited personally or by telephone, facsimile, or electronically by the directors and regular employees of the Company or other proxy solicitation services. In accordance with National Instrument 54-101 *Communication with Beneficial Owners of Securities of a Reporting Issuer* (“NI 54-101”), arrangements have been made to forward proxy solicitation materials to the beneficial owners of common shares of the Company (the “Common shares”). All costs of solicitation will be borne by the Company.

WE STRONGLY ENCOURAGE ALL SHAREHOLDERS TO VOTE BY PROXY OR BY VOTING INSTRUCTION FORM.

All proxies and voting instruction forms, to be valid, must be received by Computershare Trust Company of Canada, Proxy Department, 100 University Avenue, 8th Floor, Toronto, Ontario, M5J 2Y1, at least forty-eight (48) hours, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, before the Meeting or any adjournment thereof, being Thursday, August 27, 2026 at 11 am PDT. Late proxies or voting instruction forms may be accepted or rejected by the Chair of the Meeting in his/her discretion, and the Chair is under no obligation to accept or reject any particular late proxy.

APPOINTMENT AND REVOCATION OF PROXIES

Appointment of Proxy

A shareholder entitled to vote at the Meeting may, by means of a properly executed and deposited proxy, appoint a proxyholder or one or more alternate proxyholders, who need not be shareholders of the Company to attend and act at the Meeting for the shareholder and on the shareholder’s behalf.

The individuals named in the enclosed form of proxy are Directors of the Company (the “Management Designees”). **A shareholder wishing to appoint some other person (who need not be a shareholder) to represent him or her at the Meeting has the right to do so, either by inserting such person’s name in the blank space provided in the form of proxy or by completing another proper form of proxy.** A proxy will not be valid unless the completed, dated, and signed form of proxy is deposited with Computershare Investor Services Inc., not less than 48 hours (excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays) before the time for holding the Meeting or any adjournment or postponement thereof. **Proxies may be sent to Computershare Investor Services Inc. using one of the following methods:**

Revocation of Proxy

A shareholder who has given a proxy may revoke it by an instrument in writing duly executed by the shareholder or by his attorney authorized in writing or, where the shareholder is a corporation, by a duly authorized officer or attorney of the corporation, and delivered either to the registered office of the Company, Tupper Jonsson & Yeadon, #1710, 1177 West Hastings Street, Vancouver, British Columbia, V6E 2L3, at any time up to and including the last business day preceding the day of the Meeting, or if adjourned or postponed, any reconvening thereof, or to the chair of the Meeting on the day of the Meeting or, if adjourned, any reconvening thereof or in any other manner provided by law. A revocation of a proxy does not affect any matter on which a vote has been taken prior to the revocation.

In addition, a proxy may be revoked by a shareholder executing another form of proxy bearing a later date and depositing the same at the offices of Computershare Investor Services Inc. within the time period and in the manner set out under the heading “**Appointment of Proxy**” above or by the shareholder personally attending the Meeting, withdrawing his or her proxy and voting the Common shares.

Voting of Proxies and Exercise of Discretion by Proxyholders

Voting at the Meeting will be by a show of hands, each registered Shareholder and each proxyholder (representing a registered or unregistered Shareholder) having one vote, unless a poll is required or requested, whereupon each such Shareholder and proxyholder is entitled to one vote for each Common Share held or represented, respectively. Each Shareholder may instruct their proxyholder how to vote their Common Shares by completing the blanks on the proxy. All Common Shares represented at the Meeting by a properly completed, executed and deposited proxy will be voted or withheld from voting when a poll is required or requested and, where a choice with respect to any matter to be acted upon has been specified in the form of proxy, the Common shares represented by the proxy will be voted or withheld from voting in accordance with the specification so made.

**IF A CHOICE WITH RESPECT TO ANY MATTER IS NOT CLEARLY SPECIFIED IN THE PROXY,
THE MANAGEMENT DESIGNEES WILL VOTE THE COMMON SHARES REPRESENTED BY THE
PROXY FOR EACH MATTER.**

The form of proxy when properly completed, executed and deposited and not revoked confers discretionary authority upon the person appointed proxy thereunder to vote with respect to amendments or variations of matters identified in the accompanying Notice, and with respect to other matters which may properly come before the Meeting. In the event that amendments or variations to matters identified in the Notice are properly brought before the Meeting or any further or other business is properly brought before the Meeting, it is the intention of the Management Designees to vote in accordance with their best judgment on such matters or business. At the date of this Circular, management knows of no such amendment, variation or other matter which may be presented to the Meeting.

Advice to Beneficial Holders of Common Shares

Only registered holders of Common shares of the Company or the persons they validly appoint as their proxies are permitted to vote at the Meeting. However, in many cases, Common shares beneficially owned by a person (a “**Non-Registered Holder**”) are registered either: (i) in the name of an intermediary (an “**Intermediary**”) (including banks, trust companies, securities dealers or brokers and trustees, or administrators of self-administered RRSPs, RRIFs, RESPs and similar plans) that the Non-Registered Holder deals with in respect of the Common shares, or (ii) in the name of a clearing agency (such as the Canadian Depository for Securities Limited) of which the Intermediary is a participant. Shareholders who do not hold their Common shares in their own name (referred to herein as “Beneficial Shareholders”) should note that only registered shareholders may vote at the Meeting. Common shares held by brokers (or their agents or nominees) on behalf of a broker’s client can only be voted (for or against resolutions) at the direction of the Beneficial Shareholder. Without specific instructions, brokers and their agents and nominees are prohibited from voting shares for the brokers’ clients. **Therefore, each Beneficial Shareholder should ensure that voting instructions are communicated to the appropriate person well in advance of the Meeting.**

Existing regulatory policy requires brokers and other intermediaries to seek voting instructions from Beneficial Shareholders in advance of shareholders’ meetings. The various brokers and other intermediaries have their own mailing procedures and provide their own return instructions to clients, which should be carefully followed by Beneficial Shareholders in order to ensure that their Common shares are voted at the Meeting. Often the form of proxy supplied to a Beneficial Shareholder by its broker is identical to the form of proxy provided by the Company to the registered shareholders. However, its purpose is limited to instructing the registered shareholder (i.e. the broker or agent of the broker) how to vote on behalf of the Beneficial Shareholder. The majority of brokers now delegate responsibility for obtaining instructions from clients to Broadridge Financial Solutions, Inc. (“Broadridge”). Broadridge typically prepares a machine-readable voting instruction form, mails those forms to the Beneficial Shareholders and asks Beneficial Shareholders to return the forms to Broadridge or otherwise communicate voting instructions to Broadridge (by way of the internet or telephone, for example). Broadridge then tabulates the results of all instructions received and provides appropriate instructions respecting the voting of Common shares to be represented at the Meeting. **A Beneficial Shareholder who receives a Broadridge voting instruction form cannot use that form to vote Common shares directly at the Meeting. The voting instruction form must be returned to Broadridge (or instructions respecting the voting of Common shares must be communicated to Broadridge) well in advance of the Meeting in order to have the Common shares voted.**

Distribution to NOBOs: In accordance with the requirements of the Canadian Securities Administrators and *National Instrument 54-101 – Communication with Beneficial Owners of Securities of Reporting Issuers* (“NI 54-101”), the Company will have caused its agent to distribute copies of the Notice and this Circular (collectively, the “**meeting materials**”) as well as a Voting Instruction Form directly to those Non-Registered Holders who have provided instructions to an Intermediary that such Non-Registered Holder does not object to the Intermediary disclosing ownership information about the beneficial owner (“**Non-Objecting Beneficial Owner**” or “**NOBO**”).

These meeting materials are being sent to both registered and non-registered owners of the securities. If you are a non-registered owner, and the Company or its agent has sent these materials directly to you, your name, address and information about your holdings of securities, have been obtained in accordance with NI 54-101 from intermediaries via their transfer agent. Pursuant to NI 54-101, issuers may obtain and use the NOBO list for distribution of meeting materials directly (not via Broadridge) to such NOBOs.

By choosing to send these materials to you directly, the Company (and not the intermediary holding on your behalf) has assumed responsibility for (i) delivering these materials to you, and (ii) executing your proper voting instructions. Please return your voting instructions as specified in the request for Voting Instruction Form enclosed with mailings to NOBOs.

The meeting materials distributed by the Company’s agent to NOBOs include a Voting Instruction Form. Please carefully review the instructions on the Voting Instruction Form for completion and deposit.

Distribution to OBOs: In addition, the Company will have caused its agent to deliver copies of the meeting materials to the clearing agencies and Intermediaries for onward distribution to those Non-Registered Holders who have provided instructions to an Intermediary that the beneficial owner objects to the Intermediary disclosing ownership information about the beneficial owner (“**Objecting Beneficial Owner**” or “**OBO**”).

Intermediaries are required to forward the meeting materials to OBOs unless an OBO has waived his or her right to receive them. Generally, those OBOs who have not waived the right to receive meeting materials can expect to be contacted by Broadridge or their broker or their broker’s agents as set out above for the NOBOs.

Although Beneficial Shareholders may not be recognized directly at the Meeting for the purposes of voting Common shares registered in the name of his/her broker, a Beneficial Shareholder may attend the Meeting as proxyholder for the registered shareholder and vote the Common shares in that capacity. **Beneficial Shareholders who wish to attend the Meeting and indirectly vote their Common shares as proxyholder for the registered shareholder should strike out the names of the persons named in the form and insert the Non-Registered Holder’s name in the blank space provided on the proxy provided to them and return the same to their broker (or the broker’s agent) in accordance with the instructions provided by such broker. Non-Registered Holders should carefully follow the instructions, including those regarding when and where the proxy or proxy authorization form is to be delivered.**

VOTING SECURITIES AND PRINCIPAL HOLDERS THEREOF

Voting Securities

The Company’s authorized share structure consists of an unlimited number of Common shares without par value. As at July 22, 2026, the Company has issued and outstanding 104,357,475 fully paid and non-assessable Common shares, each Common share carrying the right to one vote. **The Company has no other classes of voting securities.** The Common shares have attached thereto the following preferences, rights, conditions, restrictions, limitations, or prohibitions:

Voting: The holders of Common shares shall be entitled to receive notice of and attend any meeting of the shareholders and shall, in respect of each Common share held, be entitled to vote at any meeting of the shareholders of the Company and have one vote in respect of each Common share held by them.

Unless otherwise specified, all items referred to herein which require a call for the voting of the Common shares will be by way of ordinary resolution which means a resolution passed by the shareholders of the Company by a simple majority of the votes cast in person or by proxy.

Record Date

The record date for the determination of shareholders entitled to receive notice of the Meeting has been fixed as the close of business on July 22, 2026 (the “**Record Date**”). Every shareholder of record at the Record Date who either personally attends the Meeting or who has submitted a properly executed and deposited form of proxy in the manner and subject to the provisions described above and which has not been revoked shall be entitled to vote or to have his or her Common shares voted at the Meeting or any adjournment or postponement thereof.

To the knowledge of the directors and senior officers of the Company, as at July 22, 2026, the only persons who beneficially own, directly or indirectly or exercise control or direction over shares carrying more than 10% of the voting rights attached to all outstanding shares of the Company, are as follows:

For the purposes of this Circular, "**informed person**" means:

- (b) a director or executive officer of a person or company that is itself an informed person;
- (c) any person or company who beneficially owns, or controls or directs, directly or indirectly, voting securities of the Company or who exercises control or direction over voting securities of the Company, or a combination of both, carrying more than 10% of the voting rights attached to all outstanding voting securities of the Company, other than voting securities held by the person or company as underwriter in the course of a distribution; and
- (d) the Company if it has purchased, redeemed or otherwise acquired any of its own securities, for so long as it holds any of its securities.

Other than as set forth elsewhere in this Information Circular, no informed person of the Company, no proposed nominee for election as a director of the Company and no associate or affiliate of any such informed person or proposed nominee has had any material interest, direct or indirect, in any transaction since the commencement of the Company's last completed financial year or in any proposed transaction that, in either case, has materially affected or would materially affect the Company or any of its subsidiaries except as follows:

The Company was a party to the following material transactions with informed persons during the financial year ended **November 30, 2025**:

- (a) legal fees totalling \$33,000 were incurred with Tupper Jonsson & Yeadon, of Vancouver, BC, a law firm in which a personal law corporation controlled by Glenn R. Yeadon, a Director and Secretary of Strategic Metals Ltd. is associated in the practice of law;
- (b) accounting fees totalling \$35,500 were incurred with Donaldson Brohman Martin CPA Inc., an accounting firm of which Daniel Martino, the Chief Financial Officer of the Company as of March 2, 2022, is a principal;
- (c) consulting and geological service fees totalling \$19,800 were incurred with Dave Kelsch Consulting Ltd., a private company controlled by David Kelsch;
- (d) consulting and geological service fees totalling \$20,975 were incurred with Snow Dog Geoscience LLC, a private company controlled by John Gilbert who was CEO and a director from March 12, 2025 to May 26, 2025 and

- (e) office rent, administrative support and geological services charges totalling \$7,707 were incurred from December 1, 2024 to January 31, 2025 with Archer, Cathro & Associates (1981) Limited (“Archer Cathro”) of Vancouver, BC, a geological consulting firm in which W. Douglas Eaton held a minority interest and was a director until March 1, 2022. When Mr. Eaton resigned as CEO and director of the Company on January 28, 2025, Archer Cathro was no longer considered a related party.

AUDIT COMMITTEE AND RELATIONSHIP WITH AUDITORS

National Instrument 52-110 *Audit Committees* (“NI 52-110”) requires the Company, as a venture issuer, to disclose annually in its information circular certain information concerning the constitution of its audit committee and its relationship with its independent auditors.

The Company’s Audit Committee is governed by an Audit Committee Charter, a copy of which is available online at www.sedarplus.ca and attached as Schedule “A” to the Company’s Management Information Circular dated March 23, 2005.

At July 22, 2026, the Company’s Audit Committee is comprised of three directors: Ms. Wallinger (Chair); Mr. Barclay; and Mr. Turner. As defined in NI 52-110, two of the three directors are “independent”. All three of the directors are financially literate. Each Audit Committee member possesses education or experience that is relevant for the performance of their responsibilities as Audit Committee members as follows:

- William A. Barclay

Mr. Barclay is a Chartered Professional Accountant, CA and a retired tax partner from an international CPA firm. He continues to work as a financial and tax consultant to a variety of long-time clients. Mr. Barclay has been a consultant to the Company for several years.

- Matthew A. T. Turner

Mr. Turner has a BSc. in Earth and Ocean Sciences from the University of British Columbia and has held the role of CEO of Rockhaven Resources Ltd., a publicly traded company on the TSX Venture Exchange, since 2008.

- Elizabeth F. Wallinger

Ms. Wallinger is a Chartered Professional Accountant, has a B.Sc. in Earth and Ocean Sciences from the University of British Columbia and an MBA from Thompson Rivers University. Ms. Wallinger is currently the Vice President of Operations for Foresight Cleantech Accelerator Centre and was employed by DMCL Chartered Professional Accountants from 2017 to 2021.

Since December 1, 2017, the Company’s Board has not failed to adopt a recommendation of the Audit Committee to nominate or compensate an external auditor.

Since the effective date of NI 52-110, the Company has not relied on the exemptions contained in sections 2.4 or 8 of NI 52-110. Section 2.4 provides an exemption from the requirement that the audit committee must pre-approve all non-audit services to be provided by the auditors, where the total amount of fees related to the non-audit services are not expected to exceed 5% of the total fees payable to the auditors in the fiscal year in which the non-audit services were provided. Section 8 permits a company to apply to a security’s regulatory authority for an exemption from the requirements of NI 52-110, in whole or in part.

The Audit Committee must pre-approve any engagement of the external auditors for any non-audit services to the Company in accordance with applicable law and policies and procedures to be approved by the Board. The engagement of non-audit services will be considered by the Company’s Board on a case-by-case basis.

In the following table, “**Audit Fees**” are fees billed by the Company’s external auditors for services provided in auditing the Company’s annual financial statements for the subject year. “**Audit-Related Fees**” are fees not

included in audit fees that are billed by the auditors for assurance and related services that are reasonably related to the performance of the audit or review of the Company's financial statements. "**Tax Fees**" are fees billed by the auditors for professional services rendered for tax compliance, tax advice and tax planning. "**All Other Fees**" are fees billed by the auditors for services not included in the foregoing categories.

The Company is relying on the exemption provided by section 6.1 of NI 52-110 which provides that the Company, as a Venture Issuer, is not required to comply with Part 3 (Composition of the Audit Committee) and Part 5 (Reporting Obligations) of NI 52-110.

Wallinger, an Equities Committee which consists of the same three directors, and a Nominating Committee which consists of the CEO and Mr. Matthew A.T. Turner. ANNUAL RATIFICATION OF STOCK OPTION PLAN

On September 9, 2022 a new stock option plan was adopted by the Board with amendments (the "Plan") to specifically address the TSXV's current Policies for Stock Option Plans. Under the Plan, based on the issued capital of the Company as of November 30, 2025, the Company would have available for the grant of stock options up to 10,435,747 Common shares, being 10% of the issued capital of the Company. This number increases as the issued capital of the Company increases. Of these 10,435,747 Common shares, 4,295,000 Common shares are reserved for outstanding stock options as at November 30, 2025. The Plan was approved and ratified by the shareholders of the Company at the 2024 and 2025 annual general and special meetings. The Plan was accepted for filing by the TSXV on June 5, 2024. The policies of the TSXV require annual ratification of "rolling" stock option plans by the shareholders of the Company.

Purpose of the Plan

The purpose of the Plan is to provide directors, officers, employees, consultants and service providers of the Company with a proprietary interest in the Company through the grant of options to purchase Common shares of the Company. By the grant of such options, the Company intends to increase the interest in the Company's welfare of those directors, officers, employees, consultants and service providers who share the responsibility for the management, growth and protection of the business of the Company, to furnish an incentive to such persons to continue their services for the Company and to provide a means through and by which the Company may attract capable persons to join the Board and management of the Company and to be employed by the Company.

General Description/Exchange Policies

The Plan is administered by the Compensation Committee (the "**Committee**") appointed for such purpose by the Board.

The following is a brief description of the principal terms of the Plan, which description is qualified in its entirety by the terms of the Plan:

1. persons eligible to be granted security based compensation under the Plan are directors, senior officers, employees, management company employees and consultants of the Company and its subsidiary;
2. the maximum number of shares in respect of which options may be outstanding under the Plan at any given time is equivalent to 10% of the issued and outstanding shares of the Company at that time, less the number of shares, if any, subject to existing options;
3. unless otherwise specified by the Board of Directors ("Board") at the time of grant, all options granted under the Plan shall vest and become exercisable in full upon grant, except options granted to eligible persons performing investor relations activities, including consultants, which options must vest in stages over twelve months with no more than one-quarter of the options vesting in any three month period;
4. the expiry date for each option shall be set by the Board at the time of issue of the option and shall not be more than ten years after the grant date, subject to item number 10 below;
5. following the termination of an optionee's employment, directorship, consulting agreement or other qualified position, the optionee's option shall terminate upon the expiry of such period of time following termination, not to exceed 90 days (30 days if the optionee is engaged in providing investor relations services), as has been determined by the directors;
6. an option granted under the Plan will terminate one year following the death of the optionee. These provisions do not have the effect of extending the term of an option which would have expired earlier in accordance with its terms, and do not apply to any portion of an option which had not vested at the time of death or other termination;
7. in any 12 month period no one person may receive options on more than 5% of the issued and outstanding shares of the Company (the "Outstanding Shares"), no one consultant may receive options on more than 2% of the Outstanding Shares, options granted to Eligible persons employed to provide investor relations services may not exceed, in the aggregate, 2% of the Outstanding Shares;
8. the maximum number of shares issuable to insiders as a group shall not exceed 10% of the total number of Outstanding shares at any one point in time;
9. options may not be granted at prices that are less than the Discounted Market Price as defined in the Exchange's policy which, subject to certain exceptions, generally means the most recent closing price of the Company's shares on the Exchange, less the maximum discount permitted by the Exchange based on the trading value of the Company's shares;

10. for any option which would otherwise expire during the period during which the Optionee was prohibited from trading in the Company's securities (a "Blackout Period"), the term of such option shall be extended such that the option shall expire at the close of business on the tenth business day subsequent to the date the Blackout Period has been terminated;
11. all options shall be non-assignable and non-transferable except as between an optionee and a wholly owned personal corporation, with the consent of the TSX Venture Exchange;
12. a "disinterested shareholder vote" is required to approve the decrease in the exercise price of stock options previously granted to insiders prior to exercise of such repriced stock options, or to approve the extension to the expiry date of any option granted to insiders; and
13. in the event of a reorganization of the Company or the amalgamation, merger or consolidation of the shares of the Company, the Board of Directors shall make such appropriate provisions for the protection of the rights of the optionee as it may deem advisable.

A copy of the Plan will be available for review at the Meeting.

Shareholder Approval

The shareholders of the Company will be asked to consider and, if thought appropriate, to approve and adopt an ordinary resolution in substantially the following form:

"RESOLVED, AS AN ORDINARY RESOLUTION, THAT:

1. the 10% rolling Stock Option Plan adopted by the Company on September 9, 2022, be and is hereby ratified, confirmed and approved;
2. the Company's directors be and they are hereby authorized until the date of the next annual general meeting to grant such number of stock options pursuant to the terms and conditions of the Stock Option Plan, as will, together with already outstanding options, entitle the holders to purchase such number of Common shares as is equal to up to a maximum of 10% of the issued and outstanding Common shares of the Company determined at the time of each grant of stock options;
3. the granting of stock options to insiders of the Company under the Stock Option Plan, be and it is hereby approved; and
4. any director or officer of the Company be and is hereby authorized, for or on behalf of the Company, to execute and deliver all documents and instruments and to take such other actions as such director or officer may determine to be necessary or desirable to implement this ordinary resolution and the matters authorized hereby, such determination to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery of any such documents or instruments and the taking of any such actions."

Unless otherwise directed, it is the intention of the Management Designees, if named as proxy, to vote in favour of this ordinary resolution. Under the policies of the Exchange, shareholder approval will be requested by way of ordinary resolution. See "**General**" below. If the ratification of the Plan is not approved by the shareholders, the Company will not be in a position to offer increased incentives to its directors, officers, employees and independent consultants.

DISINTERESTED SHAREHOLDER APPROVAL OF THE OPTION AGREEMENT WITH STRATEGIC METALS LTD.

Pursuant to a property option agreement dated July 20, 2026 (the "Option Agreement") between Strategic Metals Ltd. ("Strategic") as Optionor and the Company as Optionee, Strategic granted the Company a two-staged option to acquire up to a one hundred percent (100%) interest in the Hopper, Kluane, Batt, and Moraine mineral properties (the "Properties"), all located in the southwestern Yukon Territory.

The Company can earn an initial seventy percent (70%) interest in the Properties by completing all of the following by December 31, 2029 (the “First Option”):

- issuing 1,000,000 post-consolidation GGL shares to Strategic on or before October 31, 2026;
- incurring \$10,000,000 in exploration expenditures on the Properties as follows:
 - \$2,000,000 on or before December 31, 2027;
 - \$3,000,000 on or before December 31, 2028; and
 - \$5,000,000 on or before December 31, 2029;
- included in the initial \$2,000,000 exploration expenditure requirement is the reimbursement to Strategic of up to \$250,000 related to a 2026 exploration program on the Properties.

The Company can acquire an additional thirty percent (30%) interest in the Properties for a total interest of one hundred percent (100%) by making an additional payment to Strategic of \$3,000,000 on or before the earlier of: (i) March 31, 2030; and (ii) 90 days following the exercise of the First Option (the “Second Option”).

Following the exercise of the Second Option, Strategic will retain a two percent (2%) net smelter return royalty interest in all future commercial production of all commodities from the Properties. GGL will assume Strategic’s rights, duties, and obligations in respect of the Klauane Royalty after the exercise of the second option. GGL will have the right to purchase one-half (1/2) of the Strategic royalty interest for \$3,000,000 at any time prior to the commencement of commercial production from any of the Properties.

If GGL elects to exercise the First Option only, GGL and Strategic will form a 70/30 joint venture to explore and develop the Properties.

This transaction is subject to: (i) GGL completing a share consolidation at a ratio equal to four (4) pre-consolidation common shares for one (1) post-consolidation common share; and (ii) each of GGL and Strategic obtaining shareholder approval and TSX Venture Exchange acceptance of the transaction.

The transaction requires the approval of the disinterested shareholders of each of Strategic and the Company at a special meeting of shareholders as Strategic currently holds 30.35% of the GGL issued share capital and the transaction is a “related party” transaction as defined in Multilateral Instrument 61-101 and the TSX Venture Exchange policies. The special meeting of the shareholders of each company will be held on August 31, 2026.

Hopper Property

Strategic holds a one hundred percent (100%) interest in the Hopper property, a copper–gold exploration project located in southwestern Yukon. The property is comprised of 365 quartz mining claims and is accessible via a network of existing roads and trails. It is situated approximately 22 km north of the Otter Falls hydroelectric generator and 320 km from the deep-sea port of Haines, Alaska.

The project hosts both copper–gold skarn and porphyry-style mineralization within the Dawson Range Copper–Gold Belt. Exploration programs including geological mapping, soil geochemical surveying, airborne and ground geophysical surveying, trenching, and diamond drilling have identified multiple copper–gold targets associated with a large hydrothermal system. A 3,600 m by 1,000 m copper-in-soil anomaly encompasses the principal Copper Castle, Northern Skarn, and Hopkins North targets.

The Copper Castle target comprises at least 11 stacked copper-gold skarn horizons that have been partially delineated over approximately 1,200 m of strike length and a vertical extent of 425 m. Drilling confirmed continuity of mineralization along strike and at depth, with intercepts including 1.87% Cu and 1.04 g/t Au over 15.27 m in

hole HOP22-03 and 1.41% Cu and 0.53 g/t Au over 22.28 m in hole HOP-21-DDH-01. The skarn system remains open along strike and down dip.

The Northern Skarn target hosts skarn-style mineralization similar to the Copper Castle system but has received only limited exploration.

The Hopkins North target comprises porphyry-style copper–gold–molybdenum mineralization associated with a hydrothermal alteration system measuring approximately 650 m by 2,300 m. The target lies within the Late Cretaceous Hopper Pluton, a granodiorite intrusion emplaced during the same 75 Ma metallogenic episode responsible for the Casino copper-gold porphyry deposit. Diamond drilling intersected broad intervals of copper mineralization, including 0.22% Cu over 114.38 m in hole HOP-21-DDH-06 from surface and 0.17% Cu over 162.85 m in hole DDH-15-05. Despite its size and extent, the target remains largely untested by drilling. For more information, please see the Hopper Property Technical Report filed on SEDAR December 11, 2025, authored by Jean Pautler, P.Geo.

Kluane Property

Subject to a one percent (1%) net smelter return royalty interest held by an arm's length third party, Strategic holds a one hundred percent (100%) interest in the Kluane property, a gold exploration property located 46 km north of Haines Junction, Yukon. The property is comprised of 245 quartz mining claims.

The Kluane property hosts multiple high-grade gold-bearing quartz–carbonate vein systems within metamorphic rocks of the Kluane Schist and associated intrusive rocks of the Ruby Range Suite. Gold occurs as native gold and in association with arsenopyrite. Exploration to date has identified numerous gold-bearing vein zones through prospecting, geochemical surveying, geophysical surveying, trenching, and diamond drilling, including the Rikus, Ross, Malou, and Delor zones.

Chip sampling from multiple mineralized exposures along a 400 m section of the Rikus Zone returned an average grade of 3.85 g/t Au over 2.76 m, including a best result of 7.36 g/t Au over 9.5 m. Drill intercepts include up to 5.32 g/t Au over 2.75 m. (Rockhaven Resources Ltd. News Release June 17, 2009). Additional soil geochemical and geophysical anomalies remain only partially tested.

Batt Property

Strategic holds a one hundred percent (100%) interest in the Batt property, a copper–cobalt–gold exploration project located 68 km south of Haines Junction, Yukon. The property is comprised of 52 quartz mining claims and encompasses prospective volcanic and sedimentary rocks of the Wrangellia Terrane that hosts volcanogenic massive sulphide (VMS) and structurally controlled mineralization.

Exploration to date has identified multiple mineralized zones through geological mapping, prospecting, geochemical surveying and trenching. Trench and surface sample results include 0.71% Cu, 0.21% Co and 1.18 g/t Au over 5.7 m; 8.72% Cu, 0.05% Co and 19.9 g/t Ag over 1.0 m; and 2.18% Co with 2.37 g/t Au over 0.5 m (Strategic News Release November 30, 2022). Soil geochemical surveys have also outlined several untested multi-element anomalies across the Batt property.

Moraine Property

Strategic holds a one hundred percent (100%) interest in the Moraine property, a copper–gold–silver–molybdenum–tungsten exploration property located 90 km west-northwest of Whitehorse, Yukon. The property is comprised of 102 quartz mining claims within the Dawson Range Gold Belt and hosts skarn and vein-style mineralization with the potential for an associated porphyry system.

Exploration to date has identified two copper–gold–silver skarn zones and a nearby gold-bearing quartz vein through geological mapping, geochemical surveying and trenching. Reported results include up to 2.1 g/t Au, 425 g/t Ag and 7.22% Cu from the South Skarn, and 13.7 g/t Au from quartz vein float. (Assessment Report describing

Prospecting and Geochemical Sampling at the Hooch Property, H. Smith, December 2011). Geophysical surveys and soil geochemical sampling have also outlined numerous untested anomalies across the property.

Related Party Transaction and TSX Venture Exchange Acceptance

As the Option Agreement involves the acquisition from a “related party” (as defined in Multilateral Instrument 61-101 – Protection of Minority Security Holders in Special Transactions (“MI 61-101”) of the Company, the acquisition is a “related party transaction” under MI 61-101. Strategic is a related party by virtue of Strategic being a “Control Person” of GGL by virtue of its shareholdings in GGL, being 31,669,533 common shares representing 30.35% of GGL’s issued and outstanding share capital. In addition, Strategic is a Non-Arm’s Length Party (as defined in TSXV Policy 1.1 – “Interpretation”) pursuant to TSXV Policy 5.3 – Acquisitions and Dispositions of Non-Cash Assets (“Policy 5.3”).

In light of the foregoing, the Company is seeking disinterested shareholder approval for the Option Agreement as the entering into of the Option Agreement by the Company is considered a Reviewable Acquisition under TSXV Policy 5.3 and subject to section 5.15 of Policy 5.3. Accordingly, the TSXV requires the Company to obtain disinterested shareholder approval to approve the Option Agreement. In the aggregate, there have been approximately \$900,000 worth of expenditures incurred by Strategic on the Properties over the past six years.

Management of the Company is of the opinion that the Option Agreement with Strategic is in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders. The members of the Board of Directors agree with management, and have resolved, by resolution of the Board of Directors of the Company dated July 20, 2026, and, subject to disinterested shareholder approval, to approve the Option Agreement.

Acceptance by the TSXV for the Option Agreement is subject to, among other things, the delivery of a National Instrument 43-101 – Standards of Disclosure for Mineral Projects (“NI 43-101”) compliant technical report on the Hopper Property (the “Technical Report”) prepared by an independent Qualified Person (as such term is defined in NI 43-101). Once accepted by the TSXV, the Technical Report will be posted on GGL’s Profile on SEDAR+ and on its website following its receipt of disinterested shareholders approval for the Option Agreement. Final acceptance of the Option Agreement by the TSXV remains subject to disinterested shareholder approval by each of the Company and Strategic.

Approval Requirements

Shareholders will be asked to approve an ordinary resolution by “disinterested vote” in respect of the Option Agreement. Disinterested shareholder approval means shareholder approval by ordinary resolution, being the majority of the votes cast by shareholders voting at the Meeting, excluding votes attaching to Common Shares beneficially owned, or over which control or direction is exercised, by directors, officers and insiders of the Company and their Associates and Affiliates (as defined in applicable TSXV Policy). For the purposes of obtaining disinterested shareholder approval at the Meeting, as of the date of this Circular and to the best of the Company’s knowledge, directors, officers, and other insiders of the Company and their Associates and Affiliates own or exercise control over an aggregate of 58,788,800 common shares of the Company, and as such will be excluded from the “disinterested vote” in respect of the resolution approving the Option Agreement with GGL.

Shareholder Approval

Shareholders (other than associates and affiliates of the Company) will be asked to vote on the following resolution:

“NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, as an ordinary resolution of disinterested shareholders, that:

1. the approval of the Option Agreement between the Company and Strategic Metals Ltd., a “related party” of the Company, as more particularly described in the Company’s Information Circular dated July 22, 2026, is hereby ratified, confirmed and approved; and

2. any director or officer of the Company is hereby authorized for and on behalf of the Company to execute and deliver all documents and instruments and to take such other actions as such director or officer may determine to be necessary or desirable to implement these resolutions and the matters authorized hereby, such determination to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery of any such documents or instruments and the taking of any such actions.”

The Board believes that the granting by Strategic of the First Option and Second Option pursuant to the Option Agreement is in the best interests of the Company’s shareholders. The Board recommends that shareholders vote FOR the resolution approving the Option Agreement. Unless the shareholder has specifically instructed in the form of proxy or voting instruction form that the Common Shares represented by such proxy or voting instruction form are to be voted against the approval of the Option Agreement, the persons named in the proxy or voting instruction form will vote FOR the approval of the Option Agreement.

OTHER BUSINESS

Management of the Company knows of no matter to come before the Meeting other than those referred to in the Notice of Meeting accompanying this Circular. **However, if any other matters properly come before the Meeting, it is the intention of the Management Designees to vote in respect of the same in accordance with their best judgment of such matters.**

GENERAL

Unless otherwise directed, it is Management’s intention to vote proxies in favour of the resolutions set forth herein. All ordinary resolutions require, for the passing of the same, greater than 50% in favour of the votes cast at the Meeting by the holders of Common shares who vote in respect of such ordinary resolution.

Stock Option Plan

The Company has no other incentive plans other than its stock option plan (“Stock Option Plan” or the “Plan”).

On September 9, 2022 a new stock option plan (the “Plan”) was adopted by the Board to specifically address the TSXV’s current Policies for Stock Option Plans. Under the Plan, based on the issued capital of the Company as of November 30, 2025, the Company would have available for the grant of stock options up to 10,435,747 common shares, being 10% of the issued capital of the Company. This number increases as the issued capital of the Company increases. Of these 10,435,747 common shares, 4,295,000 common shares were reserved for outstanding stock options as at November 30, 2025. The Plan was approved and ratified by the shareholders of the Company at the 2022, 2023, 2024 (2 meetings), and 2025 annual general and special meetings. The Plan was accepted for filing by the TSXV on April 5, 2023, January 3, 2024, June 5, 2024, and September 9, 2025. The policies of the TSXV require annual ratification of “rolling” stock option plans by the shareholders of the Company. Accordingly, the Company will be seeking the approval of its shareholders to the ratification of the Stock Option Plan at its next annual general meeting of shareholders.

Purpose of the Plan

The purpose of the Plan is to provide directors, officers, employees, consultants, and service providers of the Company with a proprietary interest in the Company through the grant of options to purchase common shares of the Company. By the grant of such options, the Company intends to increase the interest in the Company’s welfare of those directors, officers, employees, consultants, and service providers who share the responsibility for the management, growth, and protection of the business of the Company, to furnish an incentive to such persons to continue their services for the Company and to provide a means through and by which the Company may attract capable persons to join the Board and management of the Company, and to be employed by the Company.

General Description/Exchange Policies

The Plan is administered by the Compensation Committee (the “Committee”) appointed for such purpose by the Board.

The following is a brief description of the principal terms of the Plan, which description is qualified in its entirety by the terms of the Plan:

14. persons eligible to be granted security based compensation under the Plan are directors, senior officers, employees, management company employees, and consultants of the Company and its subsidiary;
15. the maximum number of shares in respect of which options may be outstanding under the Plan at any given time is equivalent to 10% of the issued and outstanding shares of the Company at that time, less the number of shares, if any, subject to existing options;
16. unless otherwise specified by the Board of Directors (“Board”) at the time of grant, all options granted under the Plan shall vest and become exercisable in full upon grant, except options granted to eligible persons performing investor relations activities, including consultants, which options must vest in stages over twelve months with no more than one-quarter of the options vesting in any three month period;
17. the expiry date for each option shall be set by the Board at the time of issue of the option and shall not be more than ten years after the grant date, subject to item number 9 below;

18. following the termination of an optionee's employment, directorship, consulting agreement or other qualified position, the optionee's option shall terminate upon the expiry of such period of time following termination, not to exceed 90 days (30 days if the optionee is engaged in providing investor relations services), as has been determined by the directors;
19. an option granted under the Plan will terminate one year following the death of the optionee. These provisions do not have the effect of extending the term of an option which would have expired earlier in accordance with its terms, and do not apply to any portion of an option which had not vested at the time of death or other termination;
20. in any 12 month period no one person may receive options on more than 5% of the issued and outstanding shares of the Company (the "Outstanding Shares"), no one consultant may receive options on more than 2% of the Outstanding Shares, options granted to Eligible persons employed to provide investor relations services may not exceed, in the aggregate, 2% of the Outstanding Shares, and the maximum number of shares issuable to insiders as a group shall not exceed 10% of the total number of Outstanding shares;
21. the maximum number of shares issuable to insiders as a group shall not exceed 10% of the total number of Outstanding shares at any one point in time;
22. options may not be granted at prices that are less than the Discounted Market Price as defined in the Exchange's policy which, subject to certain exceptions, generally means the most recent closing price of the Company's shares on the Exchange, less the maximum discount permitted by the Exchange based on the trading value of the Company's shares;
23. for any option which would otherwise expire during the period during which the Optionee was prohibited from trading in the Company's securities (a "Blackout Period"), the term of such option shall be extended such that the option shall expire at the close of business on the tenth business day subsequent to the date the Blackout Period has been terminated;
24. all options shall be non-assignable and non-transferable except as between an optionee and a wholly owned personal corporation, with the consent of the TSX Venture Exchange;
25. a "disinterested shareholder vote" is required to approve the decrease in the exercise price of stock options previously granted to insiders prior to exercise of such repriced stock options, or to approve the extension to the expiry date of any option granted to insiders; and
26. in the event of a reorganization of the Company or the amalgamation, merger or consolidation of the shares of the Company, the Board of Directors shall make such appropriate provisions for the protection of the rights of the optionee as it may deem advisable.

At the date of this Form, the Company had 104,357,475 common shares issued and outstanding so that a maximum of 10,435,747 common shares would be available for issuance pursuant to the stock options granted under the Stock Option Plan. Currently, there are 4,295,000 stock options outstanding leaving 6,140,747 common shares available for the grant of stock options under the Stock Option Plan.

Oversight and Description of Director and Named Executive Officer Compensation

Named Executive Officer Compensation

The Board determines Named Executive Officer compensation at the recommendation of the Compensation Committee. The Compensation Committee consists of Matthew A.T. Turner (Chair), Elizabeth F. Wallinger and William A. Barclay, two of whom are independent directors. Mr. Turner was appointed interim CEO upon Mr. Eaton's resignation effective January 28, 2025 to March 12, 2025. Mr. John Gilbert was appointed as the full time CEO and director on March 12, 2025 and upon his resignation on May 29, 2025, Mr. Turner was again appointed interim CEO on May 29, 2025.

In setting salaries, the directors do not rely solely upon benchmarking, mathematical formulas, or hierarchy. Salary levels for NEOs are based on the executive's qualifications, experience and responsibilities within the Company, and are intended to be competitive with salaries paid to others in comparable positions within the same industry. In reviewing comparative data, the directors do not engage in benchmarking for the purpose of establishing compensation levels relative to any predetermined level and do not compare the Company's compensation to a specific peer group of companies.

The Company is an exploration stage mining company and will not be generating revenues from operations for the foreseeable future. As a result, the use of traditional performance standards, such as corporate profitability and earnings per share, are not considered by the directors to be relevant in the evaluation of NEO performance.

For the year ended November 30, 2025, the NEO that is owed compensation for his services is Mr. Martino, CFO. \$11,500 is accrued as owing to DBM CPA, a firm in which Mr. Martino is a principal, for 2025 accounting and tax services.

In addition, the Company provides a long-term incentive by granting stock options to executive officers in accordance with the policies of the TSXV. The objective of granting options is to encourage executive officers to acquire an ownership interest in the Company over a period of time, which acts as a financial incentive for such executive officers to consider the long-term interests of the Company and its shareholders.

When determining the number of stock options to be granted to an executive officer, the Compensation Committee takes into account the number and terms of outstanding stock options and vesting provisions when determining whether or not new stock option grants should be made to such executive officer. See "**Stock Option Plan**" for a description of the plan.

The Company does not grant share-based awards and does not have a non-equity incentive plan in place.

Director Compensation

The Board determines director compensation for the Company from time to time based on recommendations of the Compensation Committee. None of the directors receives any monetary compensation from the Company for serving on any committee of the Company or for attending any committee or Board meetings. Directors are entitled to receive stock options based on the level of participation of each director in various committees of the Company.

See "**Stock Option Plan**" for a description of the plan.

Employment, Consulting and Management Agreements

- (a) As of November 1, 2017, office space, some administrative support and geological services are provided by Archer, Cathro & Associates (1981) Limited ("Archer"). Archer is a consulting firm in which Mr. W. Douglas Eaton, a director and CEO of the Company (up to January 28, 2025), owned a minority interest until February 28, 2022. As at November 30, 2025, a total of \$3,997 is owed to Archer for office space, administrative support, and geological services. No fees were charged for Mr Eaton's services to the Company.
- (b) By a Services Agreement dated November 6, 2017, between the Company and Dave Kelsch Consulting Ltd. ("DKCL"), a wholly owned personal holding company of David Kelsch, the Company engaged the services of David Kelsch as President and Chief Operating Officer.
- (c) Donaldson Brohman Martin, CPA Inc. Chartered Professional Accountants ("DBM CPA"), has been providing accounting services to the Company since 2017. Mr. Daniel D. Martino was appointed CFO on March 2, 2022 and is also a principal of DBM CPA.
- (d) The Company's registered office is care of Tupper Jonsson & Yeadon, a law firm in which a personal law corporation controlled by Glenn Yeadon, is associated in the practice of law. Said personal law corporation provides legal services to the Company. Mr. Yeadon is considered an insider of the Company by virtue of

being a director and the corporate secretary of Strategic Metals Ltd., which is itself an insider of the Company.

Termination and Change of Control Benefits

Except as set out above, the Company has no contract, agreement, plan or arrangement with the Named Executive Officers and directors at, following or in connection with any termination (whether voluntary, involuntary or constructive), resignation, retirement, a change in control of the Company or a change in a NEO's or director's responsibilities.

Pension Plan Benefits

The Company does not have in place any deferred compensation plan or pension plan that provides for payments or benefits at, following or in connection with retirement.
